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The Pupil Premium is a Government initiative designed to address the under-achievement of our most disadvantaged children, nominally those who are (or have been in any of the six previous years) eligible for free school meals (FSM), or are looked after by the Local Authority. If you are the parent of a child on Free School Meals or are the carer of a child who is looked after by the local authority, you will be informed of the progress your child as a result of the interventions at Open Evenings and progress review meetings. You can also request to meet with the teacher to discuss the progress of your child and how the allocated funding has been spent at another time if the Open Evenings are not convenient. This equally applies to all parents. We take the progress of pupils throughout school very seriously and track each child individually, setting short and long-term challenging targets that are formally reviewed half-termly, in order to ensure that children are making the maximum progress possible. In 2015-2016, this resulted in increased rates of progress for these children.

As a result the school has received £106,920 for the qualifying students. An outline of how the school has targeted the spending of this money is below with many of the ongoing initiatives we currently have at Greasbrough Primary School.

We spend this money directly on the children themselves, employing additional Support Staff, Specialist Teaching Assistants and Behaviour for Learning Co-Ordinator to work with them to support their learning on a ratio of 2-1 pupils per Teacher.

Objectives in spending PPG:

1. To raise the attainment of Reading, Writing and Maths.
2. To ensure that vulnerable children receive appropriate emotional support through employing a Behaviour for Learning Co-Ordinator and a Specialist Teaching Assistant. To improve attendance of target PP children
3. To offer an enriched and creative curriculum to inspire and engage all learners, with a particularly focus on FSM Ever 6, to provide additional expertise in art, music and enterprise.
4. To offer additional support to vulnerable children through high quality intervention and classroom support through 1:1 teaching and small group work.
5. Children to on educational residentials and education visits
